Theme of the Week - Hope

On Sunday we marked the start of Advent, the preparation of the coming of Jesus at Christmas. And in the gospel on Sunday, Jesus starts by speaking about the strange signs in the sky for when the Son of Man comes again. This gospel will sound familiar because only two weeks ago, we hear the same passage but from the Gospel of Mark. We can't really be sure what Jesus meant when saying this but what we do know is Jesus will come again and we know this because God loves us dearly. The message from two weeks ago was: to live in anticipation of the end of our own life or times and to always make sure we do so with God firmly in our hearts. And just as we spend a lot of time getting ready for Christmas, so too must we spend time getting ready for the time when Jesus comes again. Advent is a special time the church sets aside for us to prepare. The Advent wreath that you will see is a good way of seeing the weeks passing - a circle of evergreen branches, with three purple and one pink candle. One candle is lit in each week of Advent (each candle represents a different theme: Hope, Peace. Joy and Love) with the pink candle lit on the third Sunday. We know that Jesus came to share love, forgiveness and peace with the world. If we share these gifts of his love each day by small acts of kindness, then we will be ready to enjoy the celebrations of Christmas and for when he comes again.

In the gospel, Jesus speaks of the end of time in metaphorical language. He is reminding his listeners that our own lives and our own time on earth will not last forever. Jesus' words are not there to make us fearful despite the fact that his words describe some devastation. His message is positive, because all the readings from Sunday point to the reality of peace and fulfilment. The promises made to a needy people who long for peace, are ones filled with hope, and tell us more about the God who makes them than those to whom they are made: a loving and provident God who offers us unlimited chances.

Some of the signs of turmoil and suffering described in the Gospel of Luke are the same as the signs surrounding the death of Jesus: disturbances in the heavens, darkness and menace. These indicate the same type of distress that accompanies any major upheaval – times that shake us completely out of our complacency. We are invited to stand before the Son of Man to receive the blessings promised by God.

During this season of Advent, we are invited to take a watchful attitude in our lives, to keep our destination in mind, so that we don't become preoccupied solely with the things that distract us from what is really important. We need to spend time on the important things, prayer and the work that we are called to do, so that we can stand confidently before Him. What are the things in your life that might hinder you from standing confidently before Christ? The season of Advent it is also important to remember that we can bring **Hope** to others? Through our commitment to our Catholic Social Teaching Principle of the 'Preferential Option for the Poor' we ask all to continue to support our Christmas Hamper appeal. How can you be more **Faith-filled and hopeful** to others who are poor this Christmas so we can bring Christ into their lives?





From the Gospel of Luke (21:25-28, 34-36)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There will be signs in the sun and moon and stars; on earth nations in agony, bewildered by the clamour of the ocean and its waves; men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world, for the powers of heaven will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. When these things begin to take place, stand erect, hold your heads high, because your liberation is near at hand.

'Watch yourselves, or your hearts will be coarsened with debauchery and drunkenness and the cares of life, and that day will be sprung on you suddenly, like a trap. For it will come down on every living man on the face of the earth. Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man.'
