Theme of the Week - St Peter and St Paul

On Sunday we celebrated the Solemnity of St Peter and St Paul. Apart from All Saints Day and the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, where both are Holy Days of Obligation, this is the only other Holy Day of Obligation given over to Saints. The earliest Roman Calendar recorded goes back to 350AD and it stated then that the 29th June should be given over to celebrate St Peter and St Paul. So we may ask why, why are these two men so special to the Church? It is because these two men are known as pillars of the Church. Peter, the shepherd, who governed from his chair in Rome was the first Pope of the Church. Whereas Paul, the Apostle, went out across nations to spread the news of Christianity through his letters and visits. These two men are the great early leaders of the Church.

This Solemnity reminds us of the need for diversity in vocations and ministries within the church. Neither of these two leaders could have achieved what they did without the help and assistance of numerous other women and men beside them. We can also imagine the difficulties, uncertainty and fear they may have come across when spreading the Good News of Christ. It is important then to acknowledge what was asked to Peter in Caesarea Philippi, "Who do you say I am?" (Matthew 16:13-15), Like Peter, we are called to a profound personal encounter with Christ, a revelation that transcends mere opinion. This intimate knowledge of Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God" must be the bedrock of our faith. Throughout their vocation the two men showed remarkable hope and love. Your decisions, rooted in Christ, have eternal significance for us as a school community and what we example. Embrace this profound responsibility with joy and courage, knowing that the "gates of the underworld shall never prevail against..." a school built on such a foundation. As we continue our pilgrimage in this Jubilee year, how can you be more Faith-Filled and Hopeful just as St Peter and St Paul were?
