Theme of the Week – Welcome

The Gospel on Sunday comes after the transfiguration. The word 'Transfiguration' comes from the Latin meaning change in form or appearance and is where Jesus appears with Moses and Elijah. The disciples are still processing what they have witnessed on the mountain, what a magical, amazing event they have just observed! Jesus then goes and brings them back down to reality as to what it truly means to follow Him. The Gospel contains a specific reference to the coming passion of Jesus Christ, where Jesus is teaching his disciples about his death and resurrection. This is sometimes referred to as the Paschal mystery. Pasch is derived from the Hebrew word 'pesach' meaning to 'pass over'.

Jesus reinforces these words about being least of all by his own actions of sitting down, assuming a position beneath his disciples, and putting a child before them. In the ancient world, a teacher's head was customarily never lower than his disciple's heads, and children were entirely without status. While this Gospel predicts the passion and death of Jesus, there are a number of other themes involved – one of which is the message that special hospitality should be offered to those most in need.

Jesus uses the opportunity of the discussion over who is the greatest to teach the disciples what the idea of "first place" must be in the Church community which they will become once he is no longer with them (remember the word 'pesach' to pass over, when Jesus goes to his heavenly Father he will be passing over the Church to those who follow).

Jesus draws on the simplicity and humility of the child as a model for us. No one is less important than anyone else. Being a follower of Jesus means to put others first especially those most in need or less fortunate. If you consider one or two of the 'great' people you know, how could they be described as servants? What do they do that puts others first?

The wisdom that comes from above is seen through our Pupil Profile. All the virtues we see show a consideration to others over greed for ourselves. If we take the virtues of loving and compassionate for instance, these two words illustrate what we can do for others and in doing so, how we can welcome Christ into others' lives. Jesus asks us to welcome those most in need. Those who have little or no one in their lives. Those who struggle and have to go without, those who are vulnerable and need that additional care and support.

So ask yourself, how can you be **Grateful and generous? Grateful** for everything God has given you (family, friends, talents, skills, humour etc.) and then **generous** by sharing what you have with others around you, especially the less fortunate so they too can rejoice in your company and experience Christ in their daily lives?

From the Gospel of Mark (9:30-37)

Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest. So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

Spring Term 1	Dignity of work and Participation	Active and curious - for example we teach learn and promote community cohesion with our ecumenical work.
Spring Term 2	Solidarity	Grateful and generous - Care by our words and actions.
Summer Term 1	Peace	Eloquent and truthful - leaders called to listen to people affected by decisions
Summer Term 2	Stewardship	Attentive and discerning - for example being proactive and informed as guardians of the earth and all creation.

We ask for parents to RSVP their attendance on ParentPay. It is essential that all parents attend.


Additional MFL GCSE and A Level Exams

TVLP News



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

A The diagram shows exactly one third of the shaded area in the original diagram. It is made up of the quadrilateral *UOPX*, together with a sector of the outer circle, *POQ*, where *O* is the centre of the original circle.

Since *P* and *Q* are two of the six points equally spaced around the circle, $\angle POQ = \frac{1}{6} \times 360^\circ = 60^\circ$. The outer circle has radius 2 cm, so the area, in cm², of sector *POQ* is $\frac{1}{6} \times \pi \times 2^2 = \frac{2\pi}{3}$.

Since U and P are also equally spaced, $\angle UOP = 60^\circ$. So $\angle UOX = 30^\circ$. Hence the area of triangle UOX, in cm², is $\frac{1}{2} \times 1 \times 2 \times \sin 30^\circ = \frac{1}{2}$. So the area of quadrilateral UOPX is 1 cm². Therefore the total shaded area, in cm², in the original diagram is $3 \times (\frac{2\pi}{3} + 1) = 2\pi + 3$.

Strategies for support learning at home
